





Danggu National Park

Frequently Asked Questions



Da<u>ngg</u>u Traditional Owners and DBCA welcome visitors to Da<u>ngg</u>u National Park.

Flooding from ex-Tropical Cyclone Ellie affected Danggu National Park and the Fitzroy catchment.

Rehabilitation and restoration of the area has occurred and will continue.

What can I do in the park?

Fishing is permitted from the shoreline.

Visitors can view the gorge and wildlife from the riverbank via a short challenging walk along an uneven, sandy surface.



Safety reminders

Please be aware of the increased risks due to the recent flooding event. For your safety:

Remain in the visitor area and observe all signs.

The trees and cliff edges are unstable and the riverbed will continue to change.

Keep away from the water's edge.

There are submerged hazards and the water is shallow. Swimming is not recommended.

Be Crocwise.

Visit during cooler parts of the day.

There is limited shade and temperatures can exceed 40°C.

Stay hydrated.

There is no drinking water in the park. Make sure to carry at least 1L per person, per hour and take regular sips.

How do I access the Park?

Access to Danggu National Park is dependent on the current road and weather conditions.

When open, you can access the park in a 2WD.

Never attempt to access closed roads and unsealed or management tracks within park.

Stay informed with the current conditions of Danggu via Park Alerts and the Shire of Derby/West Kimberley.





Can I launch my boat?

No, currently the access to the river does not allow for safe boat launching.

Will there be boat tours?

DBCA and Danggu people have made significant progress in the rehabilitation and restoration of the area. A public announcement will be made if boat tours are available.



Crocodiles live in the area.

Attacks can cause injury or death.

For your safety:

- always follow warning signs;
- stay away from the water's edge;
- · supervise children; and
- don't clean fish, prepare food or dispose of food scraps near the water's edge.

Contact the closest Parks and Wildlife Service to report:


- a crocodile that has approached you;
- a crocodile showing aggressive behaviour to people or posing a risk to public safety; or
- · people interfering or interacting with crocodiles.



Respecting Country

Da<u>ngg</u>u people welcome you to their Country. While visiting please:

- · walk safely and tread lightly;
- · take rubbish with you;
- stay within the designated day use areas;
- · don't fly your drone; and
- · stay safe and care for each other.
