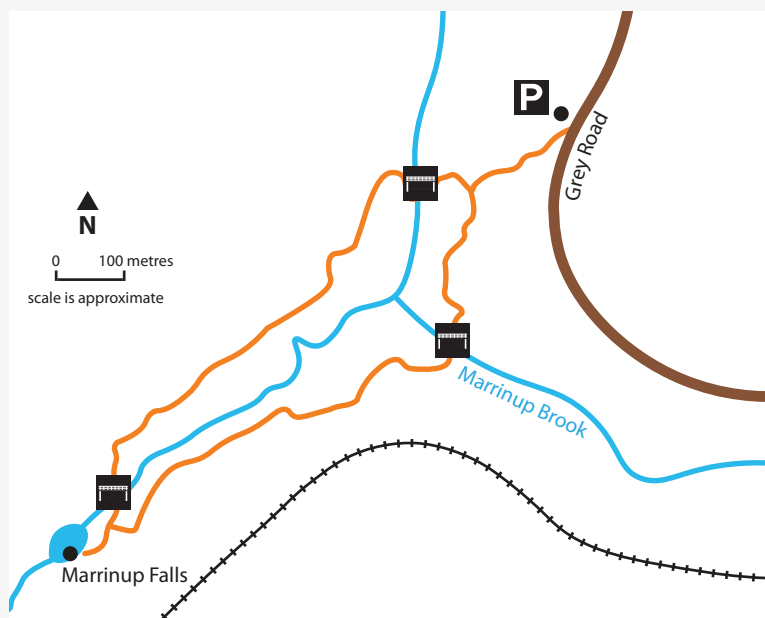
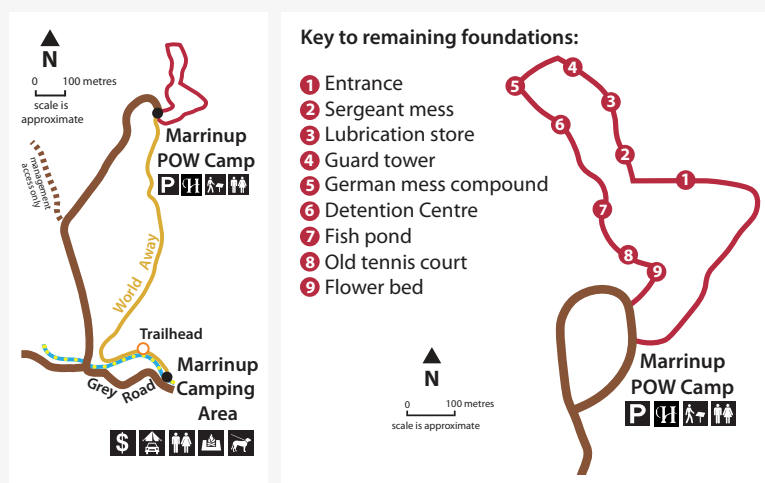

World Away Shared Use Trail

Class 2 - Easy 1.3km one way. Allow 30 minutes

This easy trail can be enjoyed by walkers and cyclists of all fitness levels and connects Marrinup Camping Area and Marrinup POW Camp. The trail follows the path taken by German and Italian prisoners of war when they walked from Marrinup to a 'cage in the bush' that felt a world away from their homeland. Dogs are permitted on a leash.



Marrinup POW Camp Walk Trail

Class 2 - Easy 1.6km loop. Allow 1 hour

An easy walk with gentle hills. Expect uneven surfaces and loose slippery gravel. Explore the captivating history of the heritage-listed WWII Marrinup No.16 POW Camp and get an insight into the lives of the German and Italian soldiers who were held captive there during the war. Dogs are permitted on a leash.



Marrinup Falls Walk Trail

Class 3 - Moderate 1.3km loop. Allow 30 minutes

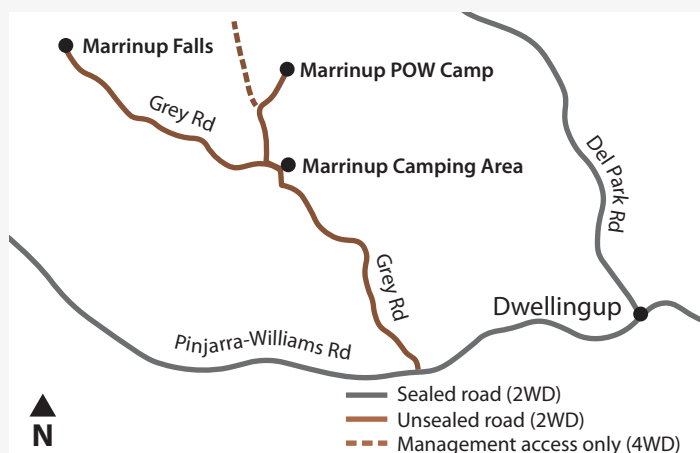
A moderate level of fitness is required for this walk. Expect some short steep hills and occasional steps. Loose or slippery rocks and uneven surfaces may be encountered. This trail winds through woodlands and rocky outcrops alongside Marrinup Brook, offering a pleasant view of the valley below. From June to early September cascading waterfalls lead to a pool at the end of the trail, and between August and November the forest is ablaze with a colourful display of wildflowers.

How to get there

From Dwellingup drive west along Pinjarra-Williams Road for 2.5km. Turn right onto Grey Road and follow to Marrinup Camping Area or Marrinup Falls, or turn right again to Marrinup POW Camp.



Walk safely, tread lightly

- Choose a walk that suits your ability and fitness level.
- Always carry plenty of drinking water and drink often (1litre per person, per hour).
- Stay on the marked trails.
- Wear boots or sturdy footwear, weatherproof clothing and sun protection.
- Tell someone responsible where you are going and let them know when you return.
- Bushwalking is not recommended in hot or other extreme weather conditions due to the risk of bushfires or winter storms.
- Loose and uneven surfaces may be encountered.
- Take extra care on wet, slippery rocks and fallen logs.
- Dogs must be kept on a leash and under control at all times, including at campsites. Please pick up after them.
- Please dispose of all rubbish, including food scraps and dog waste, in the bins provided or take it home.
- Do not rely on your mobile phone as coverage in the area may be limited.
- Stay informed by checking alerts.wa.gov.au prior to your walk.
