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# Jurien Bay marine park

The Jurien Bay Marine Park is unique world-wide for the extensive limestone reef system that runs parallel to this section of the Western Australian coastline. The park extends from Wedge Island to Greenhead and 5.5 km offshore. The marine waters encompass numerous island nature reserves and important seagrass meadows critical for the survival of many marine and terrestrial plants and animals.

The park was declared in 2003 and is representative of a temperate reef existing at its northern most limits. The influence of the southern flowing Leeuwin current on these reefs can be seen in the existence of tropical corals within areas of seagrass and stands of cool water macro-algae.

The reef is a marine enthusiast's delight with caves, grottos, and overhangs covered in multi-coloured sponges, sea squirts, sea fans, and anemones. Schools of buffalo bream, western pomfrets and wrasse can be seen swimming with warm water species including butterflyfish and lionfish. Located shoreward of the outer reefs are extensive meadows of seagrass that grow in the shallow lagoons. These areas are vital as nursery habitats for hundreds of marine animals, including juvenile fish and the commercially important western rock lobster.

The marine park is also home to several populations of the endangered Australian sea lion and is occasionally visited by other large marine megafauna such as dugongs, dolphins, turtles, long nosed fur seals and humpback whales.

# Island nature reserves

The marine park has twenty-five magnificent islands and rocky outcrops. All of them are nature reserves and eight permit limited access for visitors. Limited access means you may visit, but only during daylight hours, and you must stay on the beaches and not venture into the vegetation. Access to all other rocks and islands in the marine park is prohibited at all times.

#### Day access is permitted to beaches on:

- Favorite Island
- Boullanger Island
- Whitlock Island
- Escape Island
- North Cervantes Island
- North Green Island and South Green Island
- Wedge Island

#### Access to all other rocks and islands is prohibited.

Island nature reserves are important breeding areas for many different species including the endangered Australian sea lion, seabirds including fairy terns, ospreys and sea eagles, the endangered Lancelin Island skink, the Dibbler, and the Boullanger Island dunnart, a nocturnal mouse marsupial. For the protection of these species, pets are prohibited on any island nature reserve on the Turquoise Coast.



# Australian Sea Lions

Australian sea lions (Neophoca cinerea) are endemic to the Australian continent and are only found in Western Australia and South Australia. The Jurien Bay Marine Park has two breeding sites at North Fisherman and Buller Islands. These islands are very susceptible to interference as each sea lion colony is genetically distinct from neighbouring colonies and other populations.

When you are out enjoying the beautiful islands and waters of the Jurien Bay Marine Park, a sea lion may approach you, or your vessel. Sea lions are wild animals and are particularly unpredictable during the breeding season. They have been known to bite people and there is the potential for the transfer of diseases such as Tuberculosis. For your safety and the protection of his species, you are required to keep a minimum distance of:

- 100 metres between a sea lion and your vessel
- 50 metres between a sea lion and a person in the water
- 10 metres between a person and a sea lion on land

We are fortunate to have such amazing creatures living on our doorstep, so please help protect these endangered animals and enjoy them respectfully. ### Marine park zones

#### Know your zones:

It is your responsibility to know your zones. When further offshore, particularly when fishing, the best method of determining your position in relation to the nearest zone boundary is by using GPS device or the recfishwest app.



Zone markers can also be used to locate and line up zone boundaries. Most zones are identified on-water by yellow marker buoys that extend 1m above sea level and on-land by yellow reflective markers that are visible from the sea.

Sanctuary zones are look but don't take areas and provide the highest level of protection for marine habitat and wildlife. Non-extractive activities are permitted including boating, swimming, snorkelling, scuba diving and nature appreciation. Fishing is not permitted in sanctuary zones.

General use zones make up most of the park and allow for a range of commercial and recreational activities such as boating, fishing, aquaculture, kite and windsurfing, kayaking, diving and snorkelling.

#### Special purpose zones protect specific features or habitats.

There are four types in the park including:

Scientific reference zones - Large areas where natural processes can be studied relatively free from human influence.

**Shore-based activities** - Provide areas where beach fishing is the priority.

**Puerulus monitoring zone** - Provides for the monitoring of rock lobster larvae.

Aquaculture - provides area for aquaculture farming.

# Caring for the marine environment

- Know the marine park zones and permitted activities in the area you plan to visit.
- Fish for the future. Observe size, bag, and possession limits.
- Anchor in the sand to avoid damaging fragile reef and seagrass areas.
- Quickly return undersize and unwanted fish to the water. Use wet hands or a wet cloth when handling fish and avoid placing on hot, dry surfaces.
- Dispose of litter thoughtfully, especially plastics and fishing line.
- Stay at least 100m from whales. Please refer to the Parks and Wildlife Service website or whale watching brochure to ensure a safe and memorable whale watching experience.
- Keep a look out for sea lions, dugongs, turtles, and dolphins when boating to avoid boat strikes.

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
